

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What you need to bring with you

The student must equip themselves with the following, and at all times must have with them:

- Waterproof clothing
- Wellington boots or sturdy walking boots (to be worn at all times on campus), steel toe capped boots must be worn when undertaking the Estate Skills module.
- A blue coat and other PPE (which must be purchased from the Animal Care Department at the beginning of the course).

Without these, students are not permitted to enter the animal unit (no trainers, pumps, Ugg boots etc. allowed).

College branded clothing is highly recommended and available to order from the curriculum administrative assistant (details available during induction).

Other items required by students are:

- Suitable writing materials
- A4 lined paper

Jewellery, other that ear studs, medical bracelets and wedding rings (wedding rings to be covered) **MUST NOT** be worn on the Animal Unit at any time

• Studs only in all piercings can be worn. Any other type must be removed.

For the safety of the animals and the student: -

Nails must be worn short and unpainted at all times.







General Information

Weekend and Holiday animal duties are an essential part of animal care. They are shared out equally amongst the students, on a Rota basis. Duties involve the students caring for the animal's daily needs. Transport will be provided to and from Pulborough train station but this must be arranged in advance. Students are required to complete a minimum of 4 weekend or holiday duties in one academic year (each duties consists of 2-3 consecutive days).

All students are required to do an additional <u>compulsory 150 hours</u> of animal-related work experience (outside of college) as arranged between themselves and their Tutor (this will form one day a week over the course of the academic year) and this will be an assessed part of the course. You are expected to give details of your placement within the first 6 weeks of College. Please note that the student is responsible for finding their own work placement. The details of the placement must be given to the College, by completing a form, which will be given out during the interview and induction period. The placement cannot commence until the necessary paperwork is in place and the student has approval to start from the college.
