

What you need to bring with you

Winter 'Dress Code'

Hats - Hats which bear EN1384 or BSEN1384 ALONG WITH another accepted standard will be permitted. For example, BSEN1384 & PAS015 (1998 or 2011) along with the Kitemark will be acceptable, but not BSEN1384 on its own. Please see the BHS revised 'Hat Rules' for 2022/2023 within this document.

The Brinsbury uniform is not compulsory but is available if you wish to purchase, through the college online store.

Polo Shirts - Navy blue with Chichester College/Equine Team/Brinsbury Campus logo -.

Sweatshirts - Navy blue with Chichester College/Equine Team/Brinsbury Campus logo

Jackets - Navy blue with Chichester College/Equine Team/Brinsbury Campus logo - optional.

Jackets - Quilted or waterproof dark colours

Jodhpurs - Navy Blue/Black/neutral colours - compulsory.

Chaps - Long chaps may be worn in the winter, if wet, at the discretion of the Tutor involved.

Boots - Long leather or rubber. No long boots with laces up the sides or country boots to be ridden in.

Jodhpur Boots - Brown or black to be worn with half chaps, black or brown only.

Hair net - to be worn during riding lessons.

Gloves - Beige, brown or black must be worn.

BODY PROTECTOR MANDATORY FOR ALL STUDENTS WHEN JUMPING. OPTIONAL FOR FLATWORK/hacking.

Stable Duties 'Dress Code' - (TO BE WORN AT ALL TIMES) : -

Polo shirts, T-shirts, sweatshirts and long sleeve tops are all permitted as long as they are suitable for the yard and your shoulders are covered.

Black/Navy jodhpurs and gloves.

Wet weather clothing (dark colours) is advised in winter.

JEWELLERY - EARRINGS, NOSE-RINGS ETC. ARE NOT TO BE WORN ON THE YARD AT ANY TIME STUDENTS FAILING TO FOLLOW THE 'DRESS CODE' WILL NOT BE ALLOWED TO RIDE

Suitable writing materials (pens and pencils) lined paper and a notebook. Ensure you are suitably dressed/have the correct footwear to be on the yard

IMPORTANT INFO FOR CROSS COUNTRY ACTIVITIES: Only a "Jockey Skull" of an even round or elliptical shape with a smooth or slightly abrasive surface, having no peak or peak type extensions may be worn for any XC activity. Noticeable protuberances above the eyes or to the front, not greater than 5mm, smooth and rounded in nature are permitted. A removable hat cover with a light flexible peak may be used.

HEAD CAMS: When hats are tested against the requirements of a standard, they are done so with no extra additions on the hat i.e. with no head cam attached. Therefore, it is currently not known how the addition of a protuberance such as a head cam, effects how the hat would respond during an impact. Therefore, the use of HEAD CAMS are not recommended at any Approved Centre activity. This includes use on the head, chest, bridle or any other part of the horse or rider.

"In order to ensure riders are wearing the most up to date riding hats, please note that from the 1 January 2023, the following hat standards will no longer be accepted, due to the age of hats made to these standards:

2. SNELL 2001







Work Experience

All students are required to complete duties on Brinsbury college yard, as part of yard duties. In addition, 150 hours of external work experience is a mandatory part of the course. We can support you in finding a placement, but it is advised to have a placement in mind for September. You must not begin to work at your placement until the college has approved it.

Routine Duties

These duties are carried out on a rota basis for all students <u>and are also assessed as part of the course being studied</u>. **Holiday** and **weekend** work are an essential part of horse care and are integral to achieving the course. Duties will normally occur every six weeks.
