

Task 1 - All about me

Task 3 - Personal Statement and University Choices

The Access to HE diploma is an intensive course with the aim of getting you into a university of your choice. Part of that process includes helping you apply through the University and College Admission Service (UCAS).

Think about the course you want to go on to study. Computer Science courses vary as each University offers its own combination of modules so look at what is offer.

Personal Statement

Personal statements are important. As Access students, you have to explain your decision to enter education as a mature student. Admissions tutors at universities are looking for mature students who understand how they got where they are and are clear on where they want to go.

Pointers:

- Avoid negativity, but be honest. If school didn't work for you, briefly explain why and show why you are looking to enter education now
- Universities value life experience. Showing that you can understand the importance of events and choices demonstrates the higher thinking skills that Universities want to see.



- Show interest in what you want to do, and be clear about what your future job will involve.

Layout:

1. Intro paragraph (10% Outline your subject choice and inspiration to study
2. Information on your course at Chichester, your academic skills, subject knowledge and how this feeds into your University course choice 35%
3. Relevant Experiences/transferable skills 35%
4. Hobbies 10%
5. Conclusion 10%

You should write a partial first draft of your personal statement. This must be word processed and should cover sections 1, 3 & 4. There is support in college to help you with your UCAS applications and your personal statement. Workshops will held in the first term to guide you.
