	research report. This report will consider the strengths and
	weaknesses of your experiment.
Unit Three: Health	Here, you will understand how health is defined, and explore
Psychology	psychological approaches to health and suggest how these could
	be applied to different scenarios. Then you will explore theories
	of stress, behavioural addiction and physiological addiction,
	and apply these theories to different scenarios. There will be a
	focus on stress, specifically the causes and responses to stress,
	making judgments on the relative importance and effectiveness
	of these. The same will be done with addiction. Finally, you will
	look at how we can change behaviour.
