We are delighted you have chosen to study BTEC Applied Psychology at Haywards Heath College

WHAT YOU WILL STUDY	
<b>Unit One: Psychological Approaches and Applications</b>	<p>In this unit you will understand and apply knowledge of the four key assumptions and key concepts as they are used to explain aspects of human behaviour. You will then understand and apply knowledge of psychological approaches, assumptions and concepts by applying them to contemporary issues in society.</p> <p>This unit is assessed with an exam in January 2025</p>
<b>Unit Two: Conducting Psychological Research</b>	<p>In this coursework unit, you will understand research methods and their importance in psychology. Then you will plan your own psychological experiment using various research methods. Finally, you will conduct this experiment, and write it up as a research report. This report will consider the strengths and weaknesses of your experiment.</p>
<b>Unit Three: Health Psychology</b>	<p>Here, you will understand how health is defined, and explore psychological approaches to health and suggest how these could be applied to different scenarios. Then you will explore theories of stress, behavioural addiction and physiological addiction, and apply these theories to different scenarios. There will be a focus on stress, specifically the causes and responses to stress, making judgments on the relative importance and effectiveness of these. The same will be done with addiction. Finally, you will look at how we can change behaviour.</p> <p>This unit is assessed with an exam in January 2026</p>
<b>Unit Four: Criminal and Forensic Psychology</b>	<p>In this coursework unit you will understand the key concepts of theories and research used to explain a variety of types of criminal behaviour. You will then investigate punishment strategies and behaviour modification of criminal behaviour. Finally, you will apply different methods to create an offender profile.</p>

The below films can be watched when you study these units. When watching, see if you can spot the theories we have learnt, or apply your knowledge to what is happening in the film.	
<b>The Experimenter (12)</b> Links to the Unit One	Based on the true story of Stanley Milgram's academic investigations on obedience to authority at Yale University during the 1960s. Shows simulated and archived footage of his original experiment as detailed on the specification as well as other investigations such as the lost-letter experiment
<b>Project Nim (12)</b> Links to Unit One	Based on the story of Nim, the chimpanzee who in the 1970s became the focus of a landmark experiment which aimed to show that an ape could learn to communicate with language if raised and nurtured like a human child. Following Nim's extraordinary journey through human society, and the enduring impact he makes on the people he meets along the way, the film is an unflinching and unsentimental biography of an animal we tried to make human.
<b>Mindhunter (18)</b> Links to Unit Four	Based on the true story of the FBI in the 1950s. Catching a criminal often requires the authorities to get inside the villain's mind to figure out how he thinks. That's the job of FBI agents Holden Ford and Bill Tench. They attempt to understand and catch serial killers by studying their damaged psyches. Along the way, the agents pioneer the development of modern serial-killer profiling.
<b>Three Identical Strangers (12)</b> Links to Units One and Two	This documentary is recounts a tragically true story. New York, 1980: three complete strangers accidentally discover that they are identical triplets, separated at birth. The 19-year-olds' joyous reunion catapults them to international fame, but it also unlocks an extraordinary and disturbing secret that goes beyond their own lives - and could transform our understanding of human nature forever.
