SUMMER WORKING TASK	
Skills Focus	Reading and analysis. Responding personally and critically to a text. Selecting relevant examples. Annotation/note making. Independent research. Understanding context. Challenge: Using subject-specific terminology.
Task 1 Reading/ preparation for study	Summer Reading: essential. • A Streetcar Named Desire*— this is the first text you will study. You can also access it through this link if you are unable to purchase the text over the summer: Streetcar.pdf Summer Reading: recommended. • Frankenstein; see above. It would be helpful for you to have completed a first reading before the year starts.
Task 2 Notes	Critical Reading: Read A Streetcar Named Desire. Make a note of quotes relating to the following themes: Social class The presentation of men and women



	For each quote you find, make some notes on any devices that are used and the possible connotations of the language.
	NB: It will be assumed that you have read the play through at least once when you start the course.
Task 3 Research	Context: Research the life and work of the playwright, Tennessee Williams.
	Make notes on: • his life and experiences
	Life in America in the 1940s, specifically in New Orleans
Task 4 Your response/ writing	This is the first piece of written work that you will submit to your teacher when you start in September: How far do you feel Tennessee Williams is sympathetic to the central character, Blanche du Bois?' (500 words)
	Support your points with evidence from the events and language of the play (and remember, in drama stage directions are as important as dialogue)
Task 5 Watch	Watch film versions of the texts you will be studying this coming year:
	 'Frankenstein' (1994 Kenneth Branagh) it's not wholly faithful to the novel but is more useful for themes and characterisation than any others.
	 'Never Let Me Go' (2010 Mark Romanek). 'A Streetcar Named Desire' (1951 Elia Kazan).
