How old was Sarah Payne when she went missing?</li> <li>2. Why did the police not trust Roy Whiting's alibi?</li> <li>3. Did he have any previous convictions? (will come later in the video)</li> <li>4. Why did the police think it was important for the parents to do new TV appeals each day?</li> <li>5. When and where was Sarah's body found?</li> <li>6. What newspaper contacted Sarah about starting a campaign?</li> <li>7. How many pictures of paedophiles were published in the newspaper?</li> </ol>

	<p>8. Why was this considered controversial?</p> <p>9. How many signatures did thy receive on the petition?</p> <p>10. What did the judge say about Roy Whiting?</p> <p>11. What conference did Sarah Payne speak at in 2003?</p> <p>12. Write your thoughts about this question in your notes. 'How effective were the campaign methods used by Sarah's parents and why?'</p>
<b>Task 3</b>	<p><b>Snowdrop Campaign</b></p> <p>The snowdrop campaign is one we refer to throughout the course and is an important case.</p> <p>Watch this short video on YouTube – How '96 UK school shooting changed laws</p> <p><a href="#">(452) How '96 UK school shooting changed laws - YouTube</a></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. What town did the school shooting occur?</li> <li>2. What date did it happen?</li> <li>3. What did the shooter Thomas Hamilton walk into the school with?</li> <li>4. How many students and teachers died?</li> <li>5. How many students and teachers were injured?</li> <li>6. How many signatures did the campaign receive?</li> <li>7. What measures do you now need to undergo to get a gun?</li> <li>8. Write your thoughts about the following question in your notes. 'How effective was this campaign? Think about the changes in measures your need to undergo to get a gun that happened after the campaign.'</li> </ol>
<b>Task 4</b>	<p><b>When you are assessed in December, the biggest section is creating a campaign for change. It is worth 60% of the assessment. This activity will help us when we come to that.</b></p> <p><b>Choose a crime and create a <u>Crime Fact Sheet</u>.</b></p> <ol style="list-style-type: none"> <li>1. Explain what the crime is.</li> <li>2. Research official statistics into the crime. Is it increasing or declining? Is it more common in certain geographical areas?</li> <li>3. Who is most likely to commit this crime? What are the social characteristics of the typical offenders? Age, gender, ethnicity, social class.</li> <li>4. What sorts of penalties are there for people who commit this crime? E.g., Prison, fines, etc.</li> <li>5. Find a recent example of a criminal case involving this crime. Write an outline of the case and use your notes to try to explain why this offence happened and the impact the crime has had on individuals, communities, and society.</li> </ol>

<p><b>Task 5</b></p>	<p><b>Our first topic is analysing different types of crime (including prostitution).
